Barack Obama Wins Nobel Prize

A tremendously honorable award, the Nobel Peace Prize, first established by Swedish industrialist and inventor, Alfred Nobel, is one of the five Nobel Prizes awarded annually. As Alfred Nobel himself stated, "the Peace Prize should be awarded to the person who during the preceding year shall have done the most or the best work for fraternity between nations, for the abolition or reduction of standing armies and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses."

Less than nine months into his presidency Barrack Obama notably received the Nobel Peace Prize for "his extraordinary efforts to strengthen international diplomacy and cooperation between peoples". Through his efforts and his envisioning of a world without nuclear weapons the Norwegian Nobel Committee made the decision that he deserved the award for 2009. An unexpected honor indeed for which has most certainly raised debate and speculation across the globe.

Controversially, many have believed the Nobel Peace Prize awarded to President Barack Obama to be solely for his wondrous declamatory skills rather than his actual achievements. Whether although he may be persuading the strengthening of democracy and human rights all across the globe both parties, Republicans and Democrats, feel as though he does not entirely deserve to be awarded with such a high and honorable accolade as early on in his presidency with no accomplishment thus far.

Yet, as stated by Obama himself hours after he received the news, "I do not view it as a recognition of my own accomplishments but rather as an affirmation of American leadership on behalf of aspirations held by people in all nations."

"This prize reflects the kind of world that those men and women who have inspired me and inspired the entire globe through their courageous pursuit of peace want to build. A world that gives life to the promise of our founding documents and I know that throughout history the Nobel Peace Prize has not been used to just honor

While although Barrack Obama was "prematurely' awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, the Norwegian Committee made their decision on one sole purpose and reason.

"Only very rarely has a person to the same extent as Obama captured the world's attention and given its people hope for a better future," the committee said. While according to Thorbjorn Jagland, chairman of the Nobel Committee, the decision was "unanimous and came with ease."
